# SAN ANTONIO ISD COMMUNITY-BASED TASK FORCE Meeting #6 February 20, 2008

The sixth meeting of the Community-based Task Force was held on Wednesday, February 20, 2008, from 6:00 – 8:30 p.m. The agenda for the meeting is attached. Twenty-nine community members and SAISD staff serving on the Task Force were in attendance.

The panel of 14 students from SAISD high schools shared their perspective on their school experience. They touched on issues ranging from academic rigor, teaching styles, need for facilities and technology to give them opportunities in academics and extra-curricular activities to guidance for preparation for college and careers. The students responded to questions from the committee.

Following the students' departure, the committee discussed the themes from the student panel. The need for passionate, well-trained teachers; state-of-the-art technology; and appropriate facilities were major points made by the students.

The career technology group resumed their work on their beliefs and ideas about career technology programs and facilities and developed their Findings and Directions.

The remainder of the committee divided into two groups. One group began identifying beliefs and ideas about safety and security and aging school facilities. The other group began the same work on special programs and staffing.

The meeting concluded with identification of spokespersons to give an update to the Board of Trustees on the work of the committee at the March 3, 2008 board meeting.

The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, February 27, 2008.
