Public input sought for District's next superintendent

SAISD patrons and community members are invited to share their views on the qualities and characteristics they would like the District's next leader to have and to learn more about the search process.

A series of community input sessions have been set for the first two weeks in September at seven SAISD high schools, and an online survey is available on the District's website.

The sessions and online survey are key components in the course of selecting SAISD's 18th superintendent, which is expected to take place in January.

Earlier this summer Trustees hired PROACT Search - a group of more than 100 consultants with experience as educators - to manage the process which will include recruiting qualified candidates.

Two meetings on Trustee redistricting proposals remain

Community members who missed Tuesday's session on proposals to redraw single-member district boundaries still have time to review draft maps and offer opinions, including at one set for tonight.

Draft Map A would impact Districts 3, 4 and 5 while Draft Map B-1 calls for the redrawing of boundaries for Districts 1,2,3,4 and 5.

The redistricting is necessitated by demographic changes as determined by the 2010 Census and proposals are designed to equalize population.

Currently there is a greater than 10 percent difference between District 3 - the most populated - and District 5 - the least populated. These are served by Trustees Debra Guerrero and Patti Radle, respectively.

Hired to oversee the redistricting process is the law firm of Powell & Leon.

SAISD continues to increase its ongoing efforts to serve up meals that are both delicious and nutritious.

New menu items this year include Asian-inspired offerings such as all-natural teriyaki and orange chicken dishes over whole grain brown rice and

baked vegetable egg rolls. And turkey isn't just for Thanksgiving anymore but also will appear in the form of meat for taco salads and as bacon for BLTs.

While vegans and vegetarians have always had options there are now increased offerings.

Also new this year is a United States Department of Agriculture requirement that all students must take a fruit or vegetable with every meal. SAISD already offers them at least four servings of fruits and vegetables for lunch and two servings for breakfast, while students part of the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable program have additional opportunities for servings of fruits and vegetables per day, said Sally Cody, SAISD senior director for Food and Child Nutrition Service, adding:

"Providing healthy, nutritious meals and snacks is a priority in SAISD."

This now includes supper served to students at campuses hosting after-school programs, increasing our opportunities to provide healthy meals.

Open annual enrollment for 2012-13 under way

Employees wanting to add, change or delete coverage for medical, dental, vision, life or disability insurance have only until 11:59 p.m., Sunday, Sept. 16 to do so. This will be the only opportunity to enroll in and/or change your benefit elections for 2012-13.

BENEFIT HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2012-13

- NO plan design changes and rate DECREASES to health and dental insurance programs. The no-cost premium option will continue for "employee only" health and dental coverages.
- NO plan design changes and NO rate increase to vision, life, disability, accident, and Critical Illness/Cancer insurance programs.
- The Critical Illness/Cancer insurance will again be offered up to \$15,000 Guarantee Issue for employee coverage and up to \$7,500

Guarantee Issue for spouse coverage.

If you do not wish to make any changes, no action is required, and your 2011-12 elections will continue for 2012-13, subject to the rate changes previously stated as applicable.
