Dr. Sylvester Perez named District's 18th superintendent

SAISD's newest superintendent needs no introduction. He's Dr. Sylvester Perez, who has served as SAISD's interim since March 2012.

After being named the lone finalist for the job last month, Trustees

unanimously approved his selection at the June 17 School Board meeting, where the decision was met with cheers and applause from attendees. Perez officially begins this role on July 1 with a contract running through June 30, 2015.

After coming out of retirement to serve as interim superintendent, the Harlandale (ISD) HS graduate said his decision to stay on was based in part on his love for his hometown.

"Being a native San Antonian, I realize the importance of SAISD in this city and its future, which is dependent upon tomorrow's citizens being well educated. I want the parents and community to know that my commitment is

personal and heartfelt."

His immediate goals include expanding upon some initiated in 2012-13.

"Last year's top priority continues, which is our laser focus on literacy," he said.

"Students not reading on grade level is a major challenge and cause for concern. We want to see students reading above grade level so writing skills, AND all other disciplines will improve.

"Another priority is in continuing our trajectory in decreasing the dropout rate, which I see as not only a challenge for SAISD but an epidemic across the country. While we have moved the needle in reducing dropouts and increasing the completion rate over the past two to three years, there will be no finish line until 100 percent of our students graduate."

Prior to taking the helm as SAISD's interim, Perez most recently was superintendent of Midland ISD, from which he retired in June 2010.

He previously was superintendent for the San Marcos Consolidated, Clint and Mathis school districts.

Throughout his 40 years in education, Perez has held a variety of positions - classroom teacher, coach, athletic director, assistant principal and principal - in several school districts throughout Texas and New Mexico.

Additionally, he has earned numerous honors and awards. Among them:

- 2006 Texas Superintendent of the Year finalist
- 2006 Highlands University Hall of Fame inductee
- 2004 San Marcos Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Educator of the Year
- 1999 election (first Hispanic) to the Texas University Interscholastic League Legislative Council
- 1998 Harlandale ISD Hall of Fame inductee

Perez's master's and bachelor's degrees were earned at New Mexico Highlands University and his doctorate in educational administration from Texas A&M University.

Asked what he most would like others to know about him, Perez replied:

"That I resemble many of our students' story, and that I promise to make all decisions based on what is best for students."

After serving the District since June 2012 as interim deputy superintendent for teaching and learning, SAISD once again is bidding Dr. Peggy Stark-Wilson a fond farewell as it welcomes Emilio Castro to fill the role on a permanent basis.

In this capacity, Castro oversees and provides leadership for instructional programs and the operation of all teaching and learning activities.

The 19-year educator has served as a teacher,

assistant principal, principal, area superintendent, superintendent and leadership consultant.

Most recently, Castro led professional learning and leadership development at Lewisville ISD. This district comprising 50,000 students boasts nearly 60 schools rated *exemplary* or *recognized* by the Texas Education Agency.

Previously, he spent 13 years with Dallas ISD and two-and-a-half years with Kingsville ISD.

Castro has a master's of education in educational administration from Texas A&M University-Commerce and a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Texas.

He replaces Dr. Betty Burks, who left the District

last June.

Stark-Wilson returned for the transition after retiring in 2006 as associate superintendent of curriculum and instruction.



Rojas 'AIMS' to help boost science and math instruction

SAISD students can look forward to more exciting ways to learn math and science this fall, thanks to special training their teachers and mentors will receive.

Leading the sessions will be Liz Rojas, the District's coordinator of new teachers & mentors, who will share with them lessons she learned at the Activities Integrating Math & Science Education Foundation PLC Summit July 21-26 in Fresno, Calif.

"I am planning on bringing this training to the new teachers and mentors in after-school sessions called C.A.R.E. (Classroom Assistance with Resources & Enrichments) that are offered twice a month during the school year and also assist the Curriculum & Instruction Department with trainings in the area of math and science," the 34-year veteran SAISD educator said.

National Leadership Network and was selected for the summit

based partly upon her essay on how she believes AIMS relates to the needs of the 21st century learner.

Among the reasons she cited were: creative hands-on activities using real-world concrete learning objects; continually adapting to the challenges of establishing 21st-century skills for students, teachers and educators; and use of an integrated model of learning including doing, writing, illustrating and thinking.

Through AIMS, Rojas also has presented at

workshops and served as a trainer for math and science educators nationally and statewide.

Prior to her current assignment, Rojas most recently was an SAISD principal at Smith ES where she also was an assistant principal.

Other positions include teaching at Steele ES and serving as a campus instructional coordinator at Ball ES.

Wheatley MS assumed center court when present and past members of the Western Conference champs came to help prepare students for victory in the game of life.

The San Antonio Spurs and Miami Heat both took time out from the series finals to join forces with the National Basketball Association and State Farm Insurance for the newest NBA Cares Learn and Play Centers, which opened in their hometowns.

"I definitely want to thank all partners who contributed to this extraordinary project for Wheatley," said school principal Mae Olson.

Wheatley was chosen for the \$40,000 renovation based on the school's proximity to the team's home court, the AT&T Center, and its participation in the Eastside Promise Neighborhood federal grant program.

Following a two-week makeover, the library

was unveiled at a June 12 ribbon-cutting ceremony to show off its fresh paint job, Spurs-themed decorations, new furnishings and other amenities.

"The pictures of all the players on the walls inspire the students (to think) one day that could be me," Olson said, adding:

"Academically, the 7,000 books that were given to us will allow the students to choose books that they are comfortable reading.

"The new computers will enhance the literacy improvements that are needed for our students. It also allows the parents in the community to come and work with their students or attend technology classes."

Every year the two teams making the NBA finals sponsor a Learn and Play Center for their cities. Wheatley's is the NBA's 811th and the fifth in San Antonio.

Laura Bush Foundation for America's Libraries grants

Thanks to funding named for America's foremost former school librarian, book lovers from 11 District campuses can enjoy expanded and updated reading selections.

Since its 2002 inception during Bush's first term as first lady, the foundation has awarded more than \$10.5 million to schools in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands.
