

H-E-B awards some \$11,000 in grants to SAISD educators

San Antonio's largest grocery company also is in the market for making District educators' dreams come true.

Seven are earning nearly \$9,000 in continuing education grants, while in a surprise visit – Janice Cuccia of Fox Tech HS learned she is a finalist for the H-E-B Excellence in Education Award.

As a finalist, the health and athletic coach and her school each get \$1,000. She and Fox Tech also are eligible for one of the \$25,000 statewide awards H-E-B will later present. This award will be announced on May 15 in Austin.

Since 2002 H-E-B has honored elementary and secondary teachers in three categories through the Excellence in Education Award.

During this time five SAISD educators have been named finalists while four have earned the top prize.

The selection process begins with H-E-B customers who nominate their favorite teachers.

Next, nominees are sent an application packet asking them to share their professional experiences, educational philosophies and achievements both in and out of the classroom.

The applications are then reviewed by a team of judges who narrow the field to 223 semi-finalists.

Ultimately, 40 statewide are selected finalists.

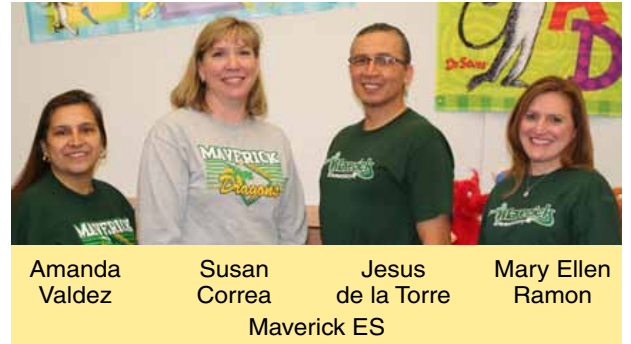
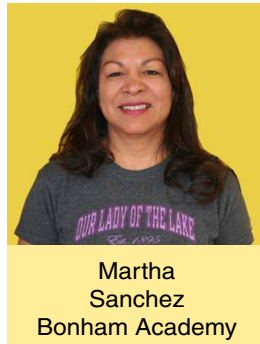
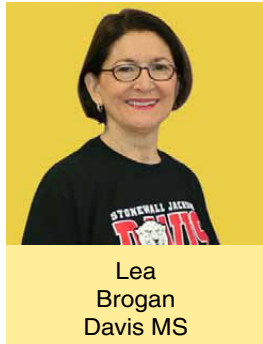
In a separate honor, the following are recipients of the H-E-B Fund for Teacher Excellence grants.

District campuses make TEA's Title 1 'Distinguished' list

The Texas Education Agency has recognized nine SAISD schools for continuously-high achievement, some of which are repeat performers.

This is the fourth consecutive year for Baskin ES and the third for Arnold ES to be named TEA Title I Distinguished Performance Schools.

Making this list for the second straight year is

Hawthorne Academy. Rising from the ranks of last year's Distinguished Progress Schools are Briscoe and Wilson elementaries.

SAISD's other Distinguished Performance Schools are Austin Academy, and J.T. Brackenridge, Maverick and Woodlawn Hills elementaries.

This distinguished designation celebrates at

least three years of strong academic performances including a minimum of *recognized* status for the two previous years.



On the road to college with Buick

SAISD Bond 2010 upcoming projects for April and May

With spring break behind us, progress escalates on the \$515 million bond issue.

Following is the latest status report on the Districtwide building improvement program.

Playgrounds

Equipment has been ordered for 45 primary school campuses. Installation will begin in April for schools not undergoing major construction.

For those campuses, installation will occur after construction is completed.

Safety and security

New security fencing has been bid for seven schools, and installation by the contractor is expected to begin in April or May.

Door key-card access controls have also been purchased, and District staff is expected to begin installing them next month.

Security access controls have been ordered and installations are planned for the first 43 campuses.

The first installation is scheduled for April 4 at Briscoe ES. A list of the schools and their projected security control installation dates can be found on our bond website. The controls will be installed by in-house staff.

Technology upgrades

On March 21, the School Board approved the purchase of computers and related software in support of all campuses. The equipment now is

being ordered and we expect delivery in April or May.

Renovations

Trustees approved the staff-recommended architecture firms at the March 21 School Board meeting. In April, meetings will be scheduled with the selected firms to negotiate contracts. The team will be managed by the Muñoz/Jacobs consortium.

Financial Forum

Update: What's the latest on the state budget crisis?

Several bills have been filed related to the state budget shortfall, and there has been a lot of discussion among the governor, legislators, superintendents, teachers and parents – but there is still uncertainty on the exact impact to public schools.

But beyond the fray, SAISD and all Texas school districts remain in the position of needing to plan for the worst and hope for the best.

In this issue of Financial Forum we detail cost-cutting actions under way to help reach our targeted goal of \$51.8 million, those under consideration, plus tips on what you can do.

Trustee-approved cuts = \$21.7 million

- Campus Instructional Support restructured
- Capital spending, travel, food and refreshments reduced

- High school student-teacher ratio increased from 25-to-1 to 26-to-1
- Sixth grade eliminated from Baskin and Briscoe elementaries
- Health plan premiums and co-pays restructured
- D.A.T.E. incentive pay program eliminated (due to loss of state grant)
- Eliminated 74 vacant department positions

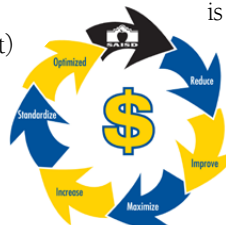
This still puts us \$30.1 million away from our target of \$51.8 million.

Administration and Trustees have identified additional initiatives for consideration totaling \$12.4 million, and these will be discussed soon at an upcoming School Board meeting. If these are approved, we will be

that much more closer to our target. The earlier these items are approved, the earlier we can inform our employees and the community.
