Progress on SAISD Bond 2010 heats up over summer

This summer, workers have been busy on Bond 2010 projects. Highlights include:

High school athletic tracks

Work to replace cinder with all-weather tracks got under way at Burbank, Edison, Highlands and Sam Houston, with completion expected in September. Track replacement at the other four high schools will start this fall.

Playgrounds

Elementary school playground installations continue. Work at Beacon Hill and Hillcrest was completed this month. Still under way but slated for completion this month are playgrounds at Foster, Highland Hills and Schenck. The playgrounds being worked on now at Franklin, Highland Park, Maverick, Wilson and Woodlawn Hills are scheduled for completion in August. Receiving new playgrounds in June were Baskin, Bowden, J.T. Brackenridge, Forbes, Herff and Rodriguez.

Safety and security

- Installation of new security fencing is scheduled for July and August at J.T. Brackenridge, Briscoe, Collins Garden, De Zavala, Foster, Highland Park and Kelly elementaries, and Davis and Whittier middle schools.

- Keycard installation at Lamar ES has been completed, while installations at Beacon Hill, Crockett, Foster, Gates, Graebner, and Madison are scheduled for completion in August.

Technology upgrades

Removal of excess equipment was scheduled this month for 25 campuses, and new machines ordered for them.

Overall, 12,000 computers and related software will eventually be delivered to 68 campuses.

Vocation/career instruction

- The new Davis MS SmartLab Learning Environment - the first of 11 middle schools to receive these career technology labs - was completed in June. Labs for the other schools are being designed and are slated for installation next summer.

- Work is under way on the portion of a Sam Houston HS classroom wing to house the New Tech HS, scheduled to open this fall.

Renovations

The initial design phase got under way this summer for major renovations.

Schools: Community meetings were held throughout June and July to introduce project architects to the communities whose schools will receive major renovations, and

to obtain feedback on external site design elements. This was the first of three phases of the design process and meetings will be held during each phase to get community input.

The next round of meetings tentatively is set for mid-September when schematic designs are completed.

Once construction begins, work will proceed in phases to ensure safety and limited disruptions. Targeted completion is mid- to late 2013 for elementaries, and mid to late 2014 for high schools.

Alamo Stadium: Meetings between internal stakeholders and construction management staff were held in June to determine District needs and related renovations.

Coming Aug. 4

The public is invited to a community meeting to meet the architects and provide input into the site-master planning for the renovations to the Alamo Stadium and Convocation Center. The gathering, which will include a tour, will be Thursday, Aug. 4, 6-7:30 p.m in the Convocation Center.

'Employee-only' health and dental coverage continues at no cost

On June 20 Trustees approved the renewal of the Humana Health and Dental programs for the 2011-12 plan year, and approved for the District to continue offering a no-cost premium option for health and dental "employee only" coverage with no plan design changes to either program.

Employee-paid premiums for the entire health

insurance program (all four plans and all coverage levels) will not increase this year. The premium increase to both the SAISD and employee contributions will be 100 percent funded by the District, representing a \$1.1 million, or 3.35 percent increase to SAISD.

Open enrollment starts Aug. 29

Once the enrollment period starts, employees wanting to add or change coverage will have until 11:59 p.m., Sept. 18, to do so.
