Schools to reap further benefits from second 'Promise' grant

Just over a year after San Antonio was selected for a federal education planning grant comes the good news that nearly \$25 million in additional funding was awarded for project implementation.

The money will be allocated over five years with the first \$4.6 million used to bolster the \$312,000 Eastside Promise Neighborhood Project grant for school and neighborhood revitalization received in the fall of 2010.

"This type of collaboration can bring about true transformation, making not only our community but our city stronger," said Superintendent Dr. Robert J. Durón when this grant was announced.

The focus is on neighborhoods that correspond with Wheatley MS, including Bowden, Washington and Pershing elementaries, Tynan ECEC and Sam Houston, their feeder high school.

Recipient of the implementation grant is the United Way of San Antonio and Bexar County, which plans to leverage \$3.1 million in additional funds over three years to SAISD.

"We are building this road together, none of us could do this alone," said United Way's Senior Vice President Toni Van Buren.

In addition to United Way and SAISD, the East Side Promise Neighborhood partnership is in collaboration with the city of San Antonio, the San Antonio Housing Authority, Family Service Association, the P-16 Council, City Year, CINOW and neighborhood leaders.

Plans include a range of services from improving a neighborhood's health, safety and stability to expanding access to learning technology and Internet connectivity and boosting family engagement in student learning.

"This will be a day we look back on a few years from now and say that's when San Antonio fundamentally changed its philosophy toward education," Mayor Julian Castro said. "This grant recognizes the intersection between families, strong neighborhoods and schools."

The local United Way was one of only five entities

nationwide to earn an implementation grant. All also are eligible for Department of Justice funding to support their public safety strategies.

YWLA art instructor lauded for her work with young women

An educator at San Antonio's only all-girls public school is the 2012 recipient of the Carrie Nordlund pre-K-12 Feminist Pedagogy Award.

Maria Elena Botello Mogas will be honored at a March 6 awards ceremony during the National Art Education Association's Convention in New York City.

Since 2002 the honor has been bestowed upon art educators who demonstrate "outstanding feminist teaching that is fair, equitable and inclusive" of all students.

"Ms. Mogas is one of the most professional teachers with whom I have ever worked. A teacher like her should not go unrecognized for her efforts and accomplishments," wrote SAISD Fine Arts Department Coordinator Isabel Romero in her nomination letter.

"Her knowledge is deep but more importantly she knows how to impart that knowledge on her students through the activities she has them engage in. She is a great influence on her students' work and their knowledge of their history and their world. She sets very high standards, guides her students through the path and celebrates their successes with them at the end."

The eight-year veteran educator - two of which spent at the Young Women's Leadership Academy -

said she includes a women's studies unit for her 6th-through 10th-graders along with their regular art instruction of drawing, painting, design, ceramics and sculpture.

She begins with activities to help them understand feminism and what it means to be a feminist. Many initially confuse these words with feminine, which they define as "girly."

"They are usually surprised to find out that feminism is a cause supporting the rights of females, and that a feminist is an advocate for women's rights," she said.

Highlighting the unit is a lengthy study on feminist artist Judy Chicago's "The Dinner Party"

that depicts place settings for 39 mythical and historical famous women. Created with the assistance of numerous volunteers between 1974 and '79, the goal of the artwork was to "end the ongoing cycle of omission in which women were written out of the historical record."

The YWLA students then create their own "Dinner Party." Other assignments include students interviewing older female relatives about their personal experiences of gender discrimination.

"The results are amazing to me," Mogas said.

While the students say they enjoy these opportunities to learn more about the lives of their mother and grandmothers, most had no idea they had ever been treated unfairly because they are female.

During the study students also compose gender statements. Many write:

"Girls can do anything boys can do."

Ultimately, Mogas said she hopes that through knowing their own history, her students "will learn to become self actualized, confident and bold as they enter their future."

In addition to being honored at the awards ceremony, Mogas will make a presentation on her teachings for Women's History Month.

Fox Tech HS earns second national Blue Ribbon nomination

An SAISD high school is one of 26 Texas public schools nominated for recognition to honor academic excellence and significant progress in closing the achievement gap.

If selected, this would be Fox Tech's second national Blue Ribbon School Award. Its first was awarded in 2000.

This year's nomination is in the category of dramatically-improved student performance to high levels on state tests.

Nominees serve as models of best practices for schools statewide, and were chosen through an objective evaluation of student achievement statistics and other data. Those selected also have demonstrated success in closing the achievement gap, and have an economically-disadvantaged population of at least 40 percent.

The nominated schools will now

complete a rigorous application process through the U.S. Department of Education. The award winners will be announced in September and recognized at the Blue Ribbon School conference in Washington, D.C.

Since 1982, this program has honored more than 6,000 of America's most successful schools, including 538 Texas public schools.
