



### Principal shares culture through Flamenco



### Teaching fellow offers Arabic classes at ALA

The new course is taught by Lari Habchard, a teaching fellow in the Teachers of Critical Languages Program. ALA is one of only 21 schools across the nation and three in Texas to host a teaching fellow in this year's program, which is sponsored by the Bureau of Education and Cultural Affairs of the U.S. Department of State. At ALA, "Mr. Lari," as the students here call him, teaches the Arabic Language and Culture class to grades 4-7 on the Fox Tech campus and leads weekly cultural activities at the Euclid campus as well.


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### Transportation plans continuity during rightsizing


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### Honoring those who maintain our learning spaces

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### Harris unveils scoreboard honoring athletic director


