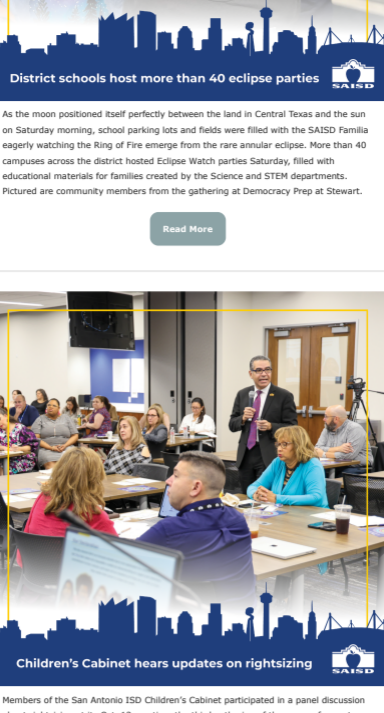


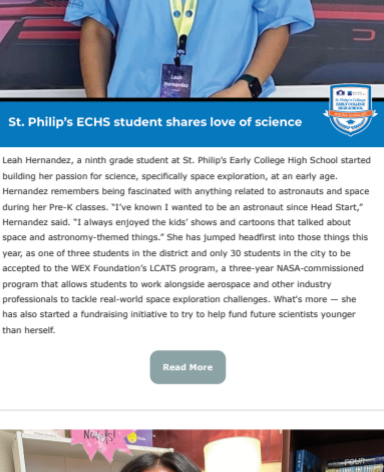

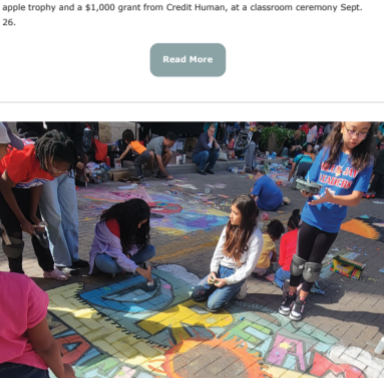
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Children's Cabinet hears updates on rightsizing

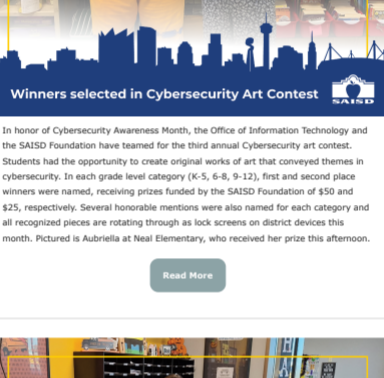
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St. Philip's ECHS student shares love of science

Leah Hernandez, a ninth grade student at St. Philip's Early College High School started building her passion for science, specifically space exploration, at an early age. Hernandez remembers being fascinated with anything related to astronauts and space during her Pre-K classes. "I've known I wanted to be an astronaut since Head Start," Hernandez said. "I always enjoyed the kids' shows and cartoons that talked about space and astronomy-themed things." She has jumped headfirst into those things this year, as one of three students in the district and only 30 students in the city to be accepted to the WEX Foundation's LCATS program, a three-year NASA-commissioned program that allows students to work alongside aerospace and other industry professionals to tackle real-world space exploration challenges. What's more — she has also started a fundraising initiative to try to help fund future scientists younger than herself.

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Longfellow teacher wins KENS-5 EXCEL award

Abby Ramos pursued teaching for the most simple and noble of reasons: she wanted to make a difference in the world. The veteran middle school English Language Arts and Reading teacher has done just that, leveraging the power of literacy to change lives. Ramos, one of the district's Distinguished Teachers of the Year for 2022-2023, has now received the KENS-5 EXCEL Award for SAISD. She was presented with an apple trophy and a \$1,000 grant from Credit Human, at a classroom ceremony Sept. 26.


