
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1Million Project Foundation kicks off giving at Lanier

San Antonio ISD and the 1Million Project Foundation announced last week that more than 5,200 SAISD high school students who don't have reliable access to the internet at home will receive wireless devices and 10GB of high-speed wireless data access per month. This represents about 40 percent of SAISD's high school students.

Getting rewarded for saving energy


At this Monday's board meeting, SAISD was awarded almost \$350,000 in incentives from CPS Energy. This amount represents rebates from completed energy efficiency projects as well as incentives from the District's performance during Demand Response curtailment events from June through September of this year. At least four campuses will be added to the Demand Response program and additional energy efficiency projects will be completed in 2020 to increase incentive amounts.
