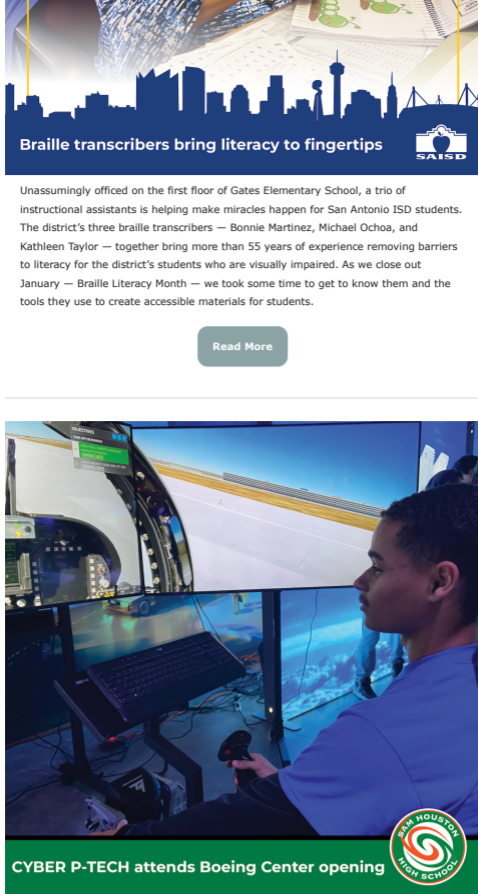

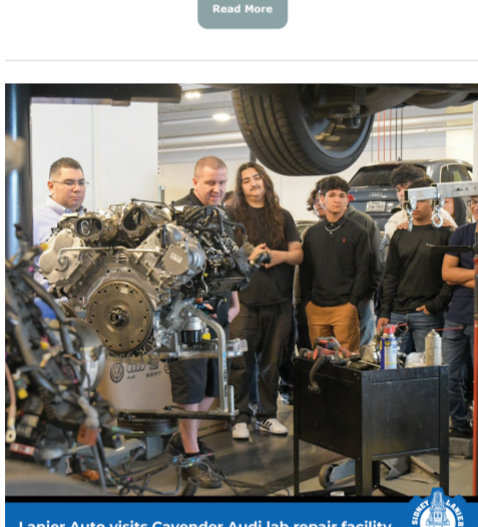
CYBER P-TECH attends Boeing Center opening

Jefferson prepares for Rodeo Bar-B-Que Cook-Off

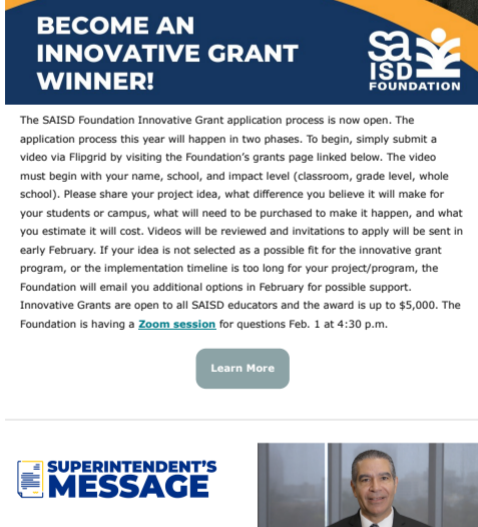

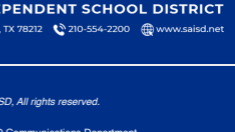


BECOME AN INNOVATIVE GRANT WINNER!

The SAISD Foundation Innovative Grant application process is now open. The application process this year will happen in two phases. To begin, simply submit a video via Flipgrid by visiting the Foundation's grants page linked below. The video must begin with your name, school, and impact level (classroom, grade level, whole school). Please share your project idea, what difference you believe it will make for your students or campus, what will need to be purchased to make it happen, and what you estimate it will cost. Videos will be reviewed and invitations to apply will be sent in early February. If your idea is not selected as a possible fit for the innovative grant program, or the implementation timeline is too long for your project/program, the Foundation will email you additional options in February for possible support. Innovative Grants are open to all SAISD educators and the award is up to \$5,000. The Foundation is having a [Zoom session](#) for questions Feb. 1 at 4:30 p.m.
