

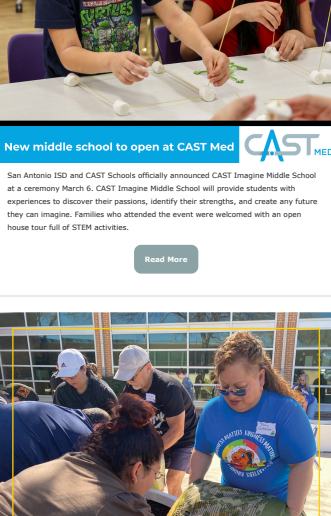

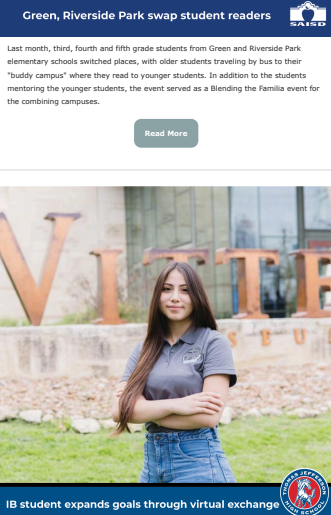

P-TECH students tour Bond construction site

A group of Highlands High School P-TECH students got an up-close look at the construction industry on Wednesday when they received a personal tour of the Highlands High School Bond 2020 construction site. Frank Garcia, senior superintendent for Satterfield & Pontikes Construction, Inc., the project's general contractor, led the tour, touching on topics ranging from the basics of building foundations to building performance and sustainability. Tour stops included the two new weight rooms and the competition gym, which, when completed, will have a capacity of just over 1,000. A new practice gym, training room, mat room for wrestling, and new restrooms are also included in the project, which is scheduled to be completed by fall. P-TECH at Highlands an early college high school in partnership with St. Philip's College, provides students the opportunity to earn an associate degree and industry-approved certifications in the areas of aerospace, engineering, manufacturing and welding.

ALA hosts virtual meeting with astronaut
