

First phases complete at nearly half of Bond 2016 schools

Many students learning in new classroom spaces

Bond 2016 construction and renovations are steadily moving forward, and in some cases, students already are learning in newly completed spaces. Nearly half of the 13 projects have finished their first phases. The holiday break offered an opportunity for contractors to work without students on campus and currently, seven schools are at or beyond the halfway mark of construction. Construction for the whole bond program is at 45 percent completion.



"The project is going well," said Terry Salli, construction project manager. "I have a good team, and I am very pleased with the way we are going and the quality of work being done. SAISD has a bright future if we keep doing Bond projects like this."

Bond 2016 is incorporating future-ready designs into Bond schools, with features that allow learning to happen everywhere. Instead of specialized rooms like science labs or libraries being located in a wing far away from the main hallways, many of the new Bond program renovations bring these specialized spaces to the hub where students can access them with ease.

"I am enthusiastic about how we are delivering this Bond program," said Kedrick Wright, director of planning

and construction. "I do feel like Bond 2016 has moved the needle as far as the delivery of the projects, quality of the projects, and the transparency about the work that is being done

MESSAGE FROM SUPERINTENDENT PEDRO MARTINEZ

Academics, options lead the way in SAISD

It has been an exciting start to this school year. In August, we launched three new options to our growing list of schools. We opened two more career-focused high school programs, which will add needed expertise to the San Antonio area – CAST Med High School will add to the pipeline of doctors and researchers and Cyber P-TECH at Sam Houston High School will turn out cybersecurity specialists.

Young Women's Leadership Academy: Primary, the city's first public, all-girls elementary school, also launched this year and is our third single-gender school option for families.

We already are looking ahead to August 2020, and developing additional program choices. This includes a Healthcare Pathways in Technology Early College High School for future registered nurses and other

healthcare providers at Fox Tech High School, as well as our second Montessori school.

The new Rodriguez Montessori

Elementary School will include a dual language pathway, which will bring the number of campuses with a dual language program to 50. We are now offering this popular option at more than half of our campuses.

With the addition of these schools and programs, SAISD is furthering its commitment to grow the number of next-generation school options.

It is important to note, however, that SAISD's academic achievements are not happening at just a few schools – it's happening at scale. We have proof points across our entire District.

The state awarded SAISD a B rating for our 2019 accountability results, up from C the prior year. We also tripled the number of A- and B-rated campuses from 2017.

The San Antonio ISD Board of Trustees, comprised of seven District residents, is the school system's policy-making body. Each trustee represents one of seven single-member districts and is elected by voters of that district. Single-member districts were implemented in 1986. Trustees serve four-year terms.

The Board's major duties include: Adopting goals and objectives for the District, reviewing and acting on policies, adopting an annual budget and setting the tax rate, electing school personnel as recommended by the superintendent, and reporting to the public on the District's progress.

New programs, school added for 2020-2021 school year

RN/Health option as well as Montessori/dual language program to be offered in fall 2020

San Antonio ISD is adding a new program and a new school to the District's ever-expanding offerings. Healthcare Pathways in Technology Early College High School, or H-TECH, at Fox Tech High School, and a Montessori/dual language program at the Rodriguez campus, will be added for the 2020-2021 school year.

H-TECH, which will be a part of Fox Tech's health professions magnet, is the second Pathways in Technology Early College High School in San Antonio (P-TECH). It will focus on preparing students with the skills, credentials and an industry-specific associate degree necessary for high-demand careers in registered nursing and healthcare. The school

will initially accept incoming ninth-graders, and subsequently expand to grades 9-12.

San Antonio ISD will open a second Montessori school on the campus of the former Rodriguez Elementary School. The new school will also feature a dual language pathway. The school will offer student-centered learning using a Montessori approach and a strong emphasis on creating independent individuals

who show empathy and compassion. The school will open with students ages 3-5, expanding to sixth grade in subsequent years.

Additionally, 42 of our schools were recognized by the state in 2019 with one or more Distinction Designations based on student performance. Each of our high schools earned at least one distinction and five campuses earned all possible distinctions.

Alongside our strong academics, we also are seeing our 13 Bond 2016 campuses grow into stronger 21st-century learning environments. You'll read more about this construction progress in our front-page story.

Taking a long-range look to 2030, we have established a facilities master plan that projects interior and exterior building upgrades of more than \$2 billion. While we cannot address all these costs at once, we will strategically plan for a series of bond elections in the upcoming years – with one possibly as early as the November 2020 ballot – to ensure all students learn in the most up-to-date environments.

Please know that a new bond, if pursued, would not increase taxes for our community's residents. Because of property value appreciation and economic development downtown, such as with the construction of the new Frost Tower, we currently are in the desirable position to update the capital needs of our schools and classrooms through future bonds – without negatively affecting our taxpayers!

We all know that education is powerful. At SAISD, we think high. We raise expectations.

1Million Project Foundation helps bridge digital divide

Thousands of devices/ data plans distributed to SAISD students

San Antonio ISD and the 1Million Project Foundation are partnering to provide access to the more than 5,200 SAISD high school students who don't have reliable access to the internet at home. In December, students began receiving wireless devices and 10GB of high-speed wireless data access per month. This represents about 40 percent of SAISD's high school students.

The 1Million Project Foundation launched in August 2017 with a mission to help one million high school students achieve their full potential by ensuring they have the digital tools and connectivity they need to succeed in school.

"In SAISD, we know how devastating the digital divide can be for our students' educational outcomes, and are tackling it through partnerships like the one with Sprint and the 1Million Project Foundation," said Pedro Martinez, superintendent of SAISD. "We appreciate our partners' understanding that many of the communities served by SAISD

represent neighborhoods that may not have access to internet services, and providing the digital tools and connectivity they need for learning everywhere."

Each participating student with the required parent permission received either a free hotspot device or a smartphone and 10GB of high-speed LTE data per month for up to four years while they are in high school. Every device has a free Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA) compliant content filter to block adult content and malware.

"The prevalence of technology in our society today means that more and more schools have turned to digital curricula to arm students with the skills they need to succeed after they leave high school," said Doug Michelman, president of the 1Million Project Foundation. "That connection extends well beyond the classroom, but only for those that have internet access at home. Students whose families cannot afford internet connectivity are at a severe disadvantage. With the support of Sprint, we are working hard to make a meaningful impact in eligible students' lives by providing both a device and connectivity to help level the playing field."

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Fine arts expansion continues

Local partnerships integral for growth

San Antonio ISD has been working to expand fine arts options for students with the help of six local non-profit arts organizations. Partnerships with The Tobin Center for the Performing Arts, Say Sí, The Magic Theatre, Spare Parts, Southwest School of Art and Artpace San Antonio are ensuring students across SAISD have the opportunity to explore a variety of fine arts options in the classroom.

"More students in SAISD have more fine arts options than they did last year, particularly in grades six, seven and eight. This gives our families a chance to find a fine arts program that they

want for their child closer to home," said Dr. Daniel Loudenback, executive director for Fine Arts. "We also expect expanded choice to lead to greater long-term retention rates, which will have a positive effect on SAISD's graduation rates, test scores, and attendance."

Contract service instructors, or CSIs for short, are one avenue the District is using to get more fine arts in schools. CSIs are fine arts professionals - musicians, artists, dancers and actors - and are hired to teach their specialty to students.

"These CSIs are practicing, professional artists," said Loudenback. "San Antonio is a very talent-rich community and these CSIs not only teach our students but can talk about what it takes to make a living in the arts with credibility; they are living proof that it's possible."

According to Americans for the Arts, a student involved in the arts is four times more likely to be recognized for academic achievement. In the 2018-2019 school year, 79 percent of SAISD

students participated in arts education, up four percent from the previous year. And in the 2019-2020 school year, 82 percent of students are participating in a fine arts option.

Free tuition with AlamoPROMISE

Students can attend an Alamo college at no cost

The AlamoPROMISE Scholar Program provides for no-cost tuition and mandatory fees for seniors graduating in 2020 from one of the 25 participating high schools, including the majority of San Antonio ISD campuses.

"I'm excited for what AlamoPROMISE means for all of our students," said Dustin Nieto, SAISD coordinator for Postsecondary Initiatives. "I believe that the majority of SAISD students would like to pursue a college education. It may be in the form of a bachelor's degree, associate degree, and/or a certification. The AlamoPROMISE is going to ensure more students have access to these educational opportunities."

According to the Alamo Colleges District, the AlamoPROMISE partnership with local government, community partners, local businesses and local

ISD's provides last-dollar funding to students at one of the Alamo Colleges for completion of a credential or three years of college at one of the Alamo Colleges. Last-dollar funding fills the gap between a student's financial aid award and the actual cost of tuition and mandatory fees.

"Say it costs \$2,400 to go to one of the Alamo Colleges," explained Nieto. "But after doing financial aid and scholarship applications, a student only comes up with \$800. What the last dollar funding does is it brings in the additional \$1,600 to help fund that student to go to an Alamo College. It will completely cover their tuition."

To become an AlamoPROMISE Scholar, a student must be a San Antonio/Bexar County resident and a senior graduating in 2020 from one of the 25 participating high schools with a high school diploma.

Inspire Awards highlights SAISD's shining stars

The ninth annual Inspire Awards ceremony was hosted by the SAISD Foundation at the Witte Museum's Mays Family Event Center. The event honored SAISD alumni and educators whose leadership and ability to make a difference are inspiring examples for students.

The Inspire Awards sponsor is the SAISD Foundation, with proceeds supporting teacher grants and student enrichment opportunities. The SAISD Foundation has awarded more than 1,000 teacher grants to support innovation in the classroom. Annually, the foundation reinvests \$3.5 million in District strategic initiatives to support student success.



CLEARING THE AIR

Over the past two years, San Antonio ISD has been awarded four grants totaling more than \$2.25 million, which will be used to buy propane buses for the District's fleet. The grant monies, which come from both state and national agencies, have been used to purchase 43 buses so far, with an additional 20 to be purchased in the future.



SAISD, Bexar County partner on developments

BiblioTech EDU to serve both schools and public

San Antonio ISD and Bexar County are partnering on two developments in the Fox Tech High School campus area: the first BiblioTech EDU collaboration, and a new parking garage with access to the San Pedro Creek area.

Both proposals have been approved by the SAISD Trustees and the Bexar County Commissioners Court.

BiblioTech EDU, a new iteration of the county's digital library, will serve as a model for public and school library collaboration. Under the agreement, the county will invest approximately \$2.7 million to redesign and renovate the existing 8,400-square-foot library at Fox Tech into a 21st-century flexible, collaborative learning commons. The opening is targeted for 2021.

BiblioTech EDU will primarily serve students in grades 4-12 from

the three schools housed on the Fox Tech campus: the Advanced Learning Academy, CAST Tech High School and Fox Tech High School.

During the school hours of 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., BiblioTech EDU will serve as the campus hub for instruction, research and learning enrichment programs for students and their families. BiblioTech EDU will offer SAISD a digital library collection to support curricular programs, and will provide innovative learning spaces.

During non-school hours from 3 p.m. to 8 p.m., the general public will have free access to library resources and technology, as well as the library space amenities including a recording studio, study rooms, community room, makers' space and robotics room. The library will operate under special weekday hours for the public during District breaks.

Additionally, SAISD and Bexar County will partner on the construction of a parking garage across the street from Fox Tech High School, at the site of the future SAISD administration building. The garage would be open to the general public on nights and weekends, as well as for event parking – providing the public with greater access to the San Pedro Creek area. The garage will serve SAISD employees during business hours.

QuestBridge College Match Scholar

Recipient receives full ride to prestigious college

Through the QuestBridge National College Match program, María García-García of Young Women's Leadership Academy has been matched with Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) where she plans to study computer science and electrical engineering next fall. The QuestBridge National College Match program is a college and scholarship application process that helps outstanding, low-income high school seniors gain admission and full, four-year scholarships to the nation's most selective colleges.

"I was blown away when I found out," said María. "I was in shock! I ran out of the room and ran to all of my teachers to tell them."

Out of 14,926 applicants this year, QuestBridge selected 5,842 finalists who were considered for the QuestBridge National College Match Scholarship. Of these finalists, 1,127 outstanding students were selected as this year's Match Scholarship

Recipients. This is the highest number of Match Scholarship Recipients to date for QuestBridge.

María wants to study electrical engineering and computer science in a dual program at MIT.

"The more I learn about MIT, the more I like them," she said. "Not only are they number one in the nation for the two programs I am interested in, but the community there is really strong. People are there to help each other learn and collaborate and engage with each other so we can make the world a better place."

Bulldog band goes for the gold








Celebrating black and gold

Following a tradition that began in 1972, Edison HS held its annual Black and Gold Show this fall. The event recognized students from various campus organizations and included student and faculty performances.




Embracing language, culture

San Antonio ISD ha estado trabajando para ampliar las opciones de bellas artes para los estudiantes con la ayuda de seis organizaciones locales de arte sin fines de lucro. Las asociaciones con The Tobin Center for the Performing Arts, Say Sí, The Magic Theatre, Spare Parts, Southwest School of Art y Artpace San Antonio se están asegurando que los estudiantes en todo SAISD tengan la oportunidad de explorar una variedad de opciones de bellas artes en el salón de clase.

"Más estudiantes en SAISD tienen más opciones de bellas artes de las que tenían el año pasado, en especial en los grados seis, siete y ocho. Esto les da a nuestras familias la oportunidad de encontrar un programa de bellas artes que desean para su hijo más cerca a casa", dijo el Dr. Daniel Loudenback, director ejecutivo de Bellas Artes. "También esperamos que las opciones ampliadas lleven a un aumento en las tasas de retención a largo plazo, lo cual tendrá un efecto positivo en las tasas de graduación, los resultados de pruebas y la asistencia de SAISD".

Los instructores de servicio bajo contrato, o CSIs por sus siglas en inglés, son un medio que el Distrito está utilizando para implementar más bellas artes en las escuelas. Los CSIs son profesionales de bellas artes y son contratados para enseñar su especialidad a los estudiantes.

"Estos CSIs son artistas profesionales que practican su profesión", dijo Loudenback. "Estos CSIs no solo les enseñan a nuestros estudiantes, sino que pueden hablar con credibilidad sobre lo que se necesita para ganarse la vida en las artes; ellos son una prueba viviente de que es posible".

Según Americans for the Arts, un estudiante que participa en las artes tiene una probabilidad cuatro veces mayor de ser reconocido por logros académicos. En el año escolar 2018-2019, el 79 por ciento de los estudiantes de SAISD participaron en la educación de las bellas artes, cuatro por ciento más que el año anterior. Y en el año escolar 2019-2020, el 82 por ciento de los estudiantes están participando en una opción de bellas artes.

Muchos estudiantes aprenden en nuevos salones



En lugar de que los salones especializados como los laboratorios de ciencias o las bibliotecas estén ubicados en un ala lejos de los pasillos principales, muchas de las renovaciones del nuevo programa del Bono incorporan estos espacios especializados al área principal donde los estudiantes los puedan acceder con facilidad.

"Me siento entusiasmado en cuando a la manera en la que estamos ejecutando este programa del Bono", dijo Kedrick Wright, director de planificación y construcción. "Siento que el Bono 2016 ha establecido mejoras en cuanto a la entrega de proyectos, la calidad de los proyectos y la transparencia sobre el trabajo que se está haciendo en comparación con el Bono 2016. Hemos tomado pasos positivos entre el Bono 2010 y el Bono 2016, y creo que se harán aún más avances cuando llegue nuestro siguiente proyecto del Bono".

Estudios académicos, las opciones abren camino en SAISD

Ha sido un comienzo emocionante a este año escolar. En agosto, lanzamos tres opciones nuevas a nuestra lista creciente de escuelas. Abrimos dos programas de preparatoria centrados en carreras profesionales que agregarán conocimiento necesario al área de San Antonio – CAST Med High School aportará a la fuente de doctores e investigadores y Cyber P-TECH en Sam Houston High School generará a especialistas de seguridad cibernética.

Young Women's Leadership Academy: Primary, la primera escuela primaria solo para niñas en la ciudad, también se lanzó este año y es nuestra tercera opción de un solo género para las familias.

También estamos mirando hacia adelante a agosto de 2020 y desarrollando opciones adicionales de programas. Esto incluye una Escuela preparatoria con crédito universitario de vías académicas en tecnología para futuros enfermeros titulados y otros proveedores de atención médica en Fox Tech High School, al igual que nuestra segunda escuela Montessori.

La nueva Rodriguez Montessori Elementary School incluirá una vía académica de lenguaje dual, lo cual aumentará el número de escuelas con un programa de lenguaje dual a 50. Ahora estamos ofreciendo esta

opción popular en más de la mitad de nuestras escuelas.

Con la incorporación de estas escuelas y estos programas, SAISD está reforzando su compromiso de aumentar el número de opciones escolares de la siguiente generación.

Es importante notar, sin embargo, que los logros académicos de SAISD no están ocurriendo en solo unas

cuantas escuelas, está ocurriendo a escala. Tenemos puntos de prueba en todo el Distrito.

El estado le otorgó una calificación de una B a SAISD por nuestros resultados de responsabilidad de 2019, un aumento de la C que recibió el año pasado. También triplicamos el número de escuelas con calificaciones de A y B desde 2017.

Además, 42 de nuestras escuelas fueron reconocidas por el estado en 2019 con una o más Designaciones de Distinción en base al rendimiento del estudiante. Cada una de nuestras escuelas preparatorias recibieron por lo menos una distinción y cinco escuelas recibieron todas las

distinciones posibles.

Junto con nuestros estudios académicos sólidos, también estamos presenciando a nuestros 13 planteles del Bono 2016 transformarse en entornos de aprendizaje del Siglo XXI más fuertes. Puede ver más sobre este proceso de construcción en nuestro reportaje de primera plana.

Echando un vistazo a largo plazo al 2030, hemos establecido un plan maestro de instalaciones que proyecta actualizaciones al interior y exterior del edificio de más de \$2 mil millones de dólares. 1Million Project Foundation ayuda a cerrar la disparidad digital

Se distribuyen miles de dispositivos/planes de datos a estudiantes de SAISD

San Antonio ISD y la 1Million Project Foundation se asocian para proporcionar acceso a los más de 5,200 estudiantes de preparatoria de SAISD quienes no tienen acceso seguro a internet en casa. En diciembre, los estudiantes recibieron dispositivos inalámbricos y 10GB de acceso de datos inalámbricos de alta velocidad por mes. Esto representa alrededor de un 40 por ciento de los estudiantes de preparatoria de SAISD.

La 1Million Project Foundation se lanzó en agosto de 2017 con una misión para ayudar a un millón de estudiantes de preparatoria a lograr su potencial máximo al asegurar que tengan las herramientas digitales y la conectividad que necesitan para tener éxito en la escuela.

“En SAISD, sabemos lo devastadora que puede ser la disparidad digital para los resultados académicos de nuestros estudiantes y la estamos abordando por medio de asociaciones como la que tenemos con Sprint y la 1Million Project Foundation”, dijo Pedro Martinez, Superintendente de SAISD. “Apreciamos la comprensión de nuestros socios de que muchas de las comunidades a las que presta servicio SAISD representan vecindarios que podrían no tener

acceso a servicios de internet, y les agradecemos por proporcionar las herramientas digitales y la conectividad que necesitan para aprender donde sea que estén”.

Cada estudiante que haya participado con permiso de sus padres o tutor recibió ya sea un dispositivo gratuito de zona con cobertura inalámbrica o un teléfono inteligente y 10GB de datos LTE de alta velocidad por mes por un máximo de cuatro años mientras están en la preparatoria. Cada dispositivo tiene un filtro de contenido que cumple con la Ley de Protección de la Infancia en Internet (CIPA, por sus siglas en inglés) para bloquear contenido para adultos y malware.

“La prevalencia de la tecnología en nuestra sociedad de hoy significa que más y más escuelas han comenzado a utilizar los planes de estudio digitales para dotar a los estudiantes con las habilidades que necesitan para tener éxito cuando salen de la preparatoria”, dijo Doug Michelman, presidente de la 1Million Project Foundation. “Esa conexión se amplía mucho más allá del salón de clase, pero solo para quienes tienen acceso a internet en casa. Los estudiantes cuyas familias no pueden pagar los costos de servicio de conectividad de internet

están en una desventaja severa. Con el apoyo de Sprint, estamos trabajando arduamente para tener un impacto significativo en las vidas de los estudiantes elegibles al proporcionar tanto un dispositivo y la conectividad para ayudar a equilibrar el terreno de juego”.



Matrícula gratuita con AlamoPROMISE

El AlamoPROMISE Scholar Program proporciona matrícula y cuotas obligatorias gratuitas para los estudiantes de último año de preparatoria que se gradúen en 2020 de una de 25 preparatorias participantes, entre ellas la mayoría de las escuelas de San Antonio ISD.

Según el Alamo Colleges District, la asociación de AlamoPROMISE con el gobierno local, con los socios comunitarios, con los negocios locales y los distritos escolares independientes locales proporciona fondos de etapa final a los estudiantes en una de las escuelas de Alamo Colleges para que completen una credencial o tres años universitarios en una de las escuelas de Alamo Colleges. Los fondos de etapa final cubren la diferencia entre la cantidad de ayuda financiera del estudiante y el costo real de la matrícula y las cuotas obligatorias.

BiblioTech EDU servirá tanto a las escuelas como al público

San Antonio ISD y el condado de Bexar se están asociando en dos innovaciones en el área del plantel de Fox Tech High School: la primera colaboración de BiblioTech EDU y un nuevo garaje de estacionamiento con acceso al área de San Pedro Creek.

Ambas propuestas han sido aprobadas por el Consejo Directivo de SAISD y la Corte de Comisionados del Condado de Bexar.

BiblioTech EDU, una nueva iteración de la biblioteca digital del condado, servirá como un modelo para la colaboración de bibliotecas públicas y escolares. Según el acuerdo, el condado invertirá aproximadamente \$2.7 millones de dólares para volver a diseñar y renovar la biblioteca de 8400 pies cuadrados en Fox Tech en un área de aprendizaje colaborativa común flexible del siglo XXI. BiblioTech EDU le ofrecerá a SAISD una colección de biblioteca digital para apoyar los programas curriculares y proporcionará espacios de aprendizaje innovadores.
