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Students, Families, and Staff:

Throughout this pandemic, San Antonio ISD has taken the lead in ensuring our learning environments are as safe as possible for our children and educators. We have implemented sound strategies and best practices around mask wearing, weekly COVID-19 testing and vaccinations, social distancing, sanitation, and ventilation. As a result, we have seen less than a 2% positivity rate in our schools so far this year.

We have proven that parents do not have to choose between safety and strong academic support. Parents and children deserve both. We are grateful for this outcome and continue to be proud of the staff, parents, and students who continue to support and follow our safety efforts.

We want you to know that your child is important to us – and we care just as much about their academic achievement as their social and emotional health. We know this pandemic has taken a toll. That is why, with your input, we have created – and will continue to update – a multi-year plan for academic and social emotional recovery, funded through the federal “American Rescue Plan” (ESSER).

Through ESSER funds, we are expanding access to social workers and deploying social-emotional specialists by scaling up our community partnerships, hiring additional Licensed Clinical Social Workers, and establishing a District-level clinical team to support a greater distribution of resources.

We also are providing intensive support at upper grade levels so that high school students have increased access to academic deans, behavior analysts and specialists, and special education resources. Students of all ages will have grade-appropriate instruction on mental health.

In preparation, all secondary teachers participated in a six-hour Youth Mental Health First Aid national certification course in August. Trainers from this course will be facilitating additional conversations and training to allow teachers to debrief and further apply their knowledge.

So that you know what to expect this school year, we welcome you to carefully review our Safe Return to In-Person Learning and Continuity Plan, which is detailed on the following pages. This plan continues to be informed by your input and guidance from the following entities:

Principals

Since April of 2021, the Superintendent and his executive leadership team have met weekly with school principals to prepare for the 2021-2022 school year. Principal feedback during this process is critical to planning and executing a safe plan for school opening.



The events around the COVID-19 pandemic continue to make this a challenging year, but the District has taken a comprehensive and thoughtful approach to ensuring all teachers are prepared to keep academic progress a priority and address the needs of our students while delivering high-quality instruction. Advanced Placement

San Antonio ISD schools offer a variety of Advanced Placement (AP) courses that allow students to experience a college-level course while in high school. Each AP course concludes with an opportunity for students to earn college credit by obtaining a recommended score on a corresponding AP examination. The AP examinations are structured to measure three areas - depth of knowledge, completeness of thought, and synthesis of ideas. AP courses are offered in the core content areas as well as elective courses.

Athletics

The Athletics Department has incorporated prevention, mitigation, and response measures in response to COVID-19. The San Antonio ISD [Return to Play Playbook](#) is intended to provide additional details regarding the shared commitments and protocols specific to District athletic and campus facilities. The current protocols for COVID-19 safety, including the San Antonio ISD Summer Strength and Conditioning Protocols, and COVID-19 Training for Cleaning and Disinfecting can be found on the [Athletics webpage](#). For the 2021-2022 school year the focus of the Athletics Department is to allow its athletes the opportunity to participate in sports in a safe format.

Career and Technology Education (CTE)

The Career & Technical Education Department is committed to supporting San Antonio ISD's mission of preparing its students for an ever-changing world by providing rigorous instruction aligned with the demands and expectations of industry needs and local workforce. Programs of study offered focus on in-demand, high-wage, career opportunities. There are dual credit and industry-based certifications available through the programs of study.

Disability Services

The Department of Disability Services recognizes that students with disabilities may have unique needs that may impact their ability to participate meaningfully in different instructional settings. Additional considerations for these students may include learning style, access to specialized materials and equipment, and student health status, which should be addressed via the ARD or §504 Process. In the event that a student has a medical issue that may prevent the student from participating safely via in-person instruction, a parent should reach out to their child's campus to initiate consideration for [Homebound Services](#).

Dual Credit/Dual Enrollment

San Antonio ISD high schools offer a wide variety of courses that allow students to earn college credit while in high school. These courses may be offered in core academic and elective areas as well as in Career and Technology. The District works closely with its college partners to ensure that students can continue to take advantage of the opportunity for early college credit in virtual or hybrid course offerings.

Dual Language, ESL, & Migrant

The Dual Language, ESL & Migrant Department will provide face to face language development and migrant program services and ensure that Emergent Bilingual students receive linguistic accommodations in culturally and linguistically responsive classroom settings throughout the 2021-2022 school year. Dual Language and/or ESL programs will be offered on [all campuses](#) with appropriately certified teachers and staff. The [International Welcome Center](#) will continue to provide placement testing and wraparound services in person.

Early Childhood Education

San Antonio ISD has a long-rooted commitment and a dedicated focus in providing high-quality early childhood education for our youngest scholars. For over 20 years, the District has offered full-day Pre-K to students ages 3- and 4- years old with teachers certified in early childhood education (ECE) and instructional assistants in every ECE class. San Antonio ISD is the only district in Bexar County to offer universal Pre-K. Ongoing collaboration with its strategic partners, including the City of San Antonio Head Start and Communities in Schools (CIS) Parent and Child Emotional (PACE) Wellness Team, provide services to our campuses that offer Pre-K.

Educational Technology

All students and teachers in grades Pre-K through 12 students have access to robust digital resources to support in-person and virtual learning, without disruption to high-quality instruction. Canvas, the District's learning management system (LMS), is made up of a powerful set of highly integrated learning products that allow teachers and schools the ability to customize their digital learning platforms. It operates as a central hub for curriculum, instruction, assessment, and mastery courses, and has a built-in assessment system with analytics to measure mastery of content. Canvas integrates with emerging technology and educational software apps such as Google, Microsoft, and Adobe, and incorporates dynamic communication tools for the digital classroom including calendars, announcements, and discussion boards. It also supports the use of assistive technology with Immersive Reader, Closed Caption, video annotation, and language translators.

The Canvas Learning Management System leverages technology in the [blended learning](#) classroom. In addition, Canvas serves as a collaboration platform for active learning and a communication tool for students and families.

In the event of an unexpected COVID-19 campus closure, the District will support the transition to remote learning by ensuring access to the Canvas LMS and other digital tools listed below so as to minimize any disruption in daily instruction.

Digital Tool	Grade Levels	Description
ClassLink Single Sign-On	PK-12	Provides access to apps, e-books, digital textbooks, and other digital tools. Students will be provided with QR codes to easily login to resources.
Canvas LMS	PK-12	Teachers publish their course content online including lesson activities, assessments, videos, contact and communication protocols, course syllabus or calendar, and link to other apps such as Google, Kami, Seesaw or PearDeck.
Seesaw	PK-3	A digital portfolio used in the lower grades to share and upload assignments for young children and serves as a communication tool for parents.
Zoom	PK-12	A web conferencing tool used for live class instruction.

Campus administrators will ensure that all teachers and students have access to district-provided digital resources and devices. The Office of Academics and School Leadership has developed a remote learning guide for the 2021-2022 school year to provide further guidance. Fine Arts

The Fine Arts Department has implemented safety measures to ensure a safe and secure learning environment. The safety guidelines include indoor masking, social distancing, scheduling considerations, and the use of water bottles. For all fine arts classes, masks must be worn at all times while in the classroom. Students and teachers should maintain a physical distancing as recommended by the CDC which includes 3 feet to the maximum extent possible. The Fine Arts Department will furnish face masks with slits for equipment that requires the use of a mouthpiece. In addition, bell covers will be provided for all wind instruments. All instrumental music students should have two masks that include one for the school day and one performance mask with slits for mouthpiece placement. Water stations or fountains should not be utilized. Students are encouraged to bring their own water bottle. Brass players will use puppy pads provided by the department to collect condensation from their instruments. The Fine Arts Department has provided [guidance](#) on outdoor rehearsals for band, the dance team, cheer team, and pep squad. Scheduling considerations have been made at the elementary level for those fine arts teachers who visit two campuses during a normal schedule.

Gifted and Talented Education (GATE)

The Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) Department aims to transform potential in youth into outstanding achievement in adulthood. The District is committed to identifying and nurturing individual strengths in order to cultivate the unique intellectual and academic gifts and talents of our students. GATE services are provided at every San Antonio ISD campus by teachers trained in differentiation practices that they implement in their classroom and supplemented with face to face enrichment services provided by District GATE Specialists.

Health & Physical Education

The Health & Physical Education Department provides students the opportunity to develop the mind, body, and spirit in a safe learning environment. Physical activity is important for students' overall well-being. The Health & Physical Education Department will continue to provide opportunities for structured outdoor and indoor learning. Safety guidelines for the program include masking, social distancing, sanitizing, and the use of water bottles, in accordance with the District Health and Safety Protocols and CDC COVID-19 Prevention K-12 School guidelines. When increasing movement from moderate to vigorous physical activity, several zones will be provided for students to sanitize and recover. Teachers will continue to [clean and disinfect](#) equipment and spaces, according to District guidelines.

JROTC/LOTC

The U.S. Army Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) is one of the largest character development and citizenship programs for youth in the world.

Literacy and Biliteracy

San Antonio ISD believes that the pathway forward is through rigorous Tier 1 instruction for all students that includes reading and writing in all content areas. The [Literacy and Biliteracy District Plan](#) will ensure comprehensive planning for instruction that begins with grade-level standards and complex texts, provides routines aligned to the Science of Teaching Reading and supports both literacy and biliteracy trajectories, and identifies the necessary scaffolds to support intervention and enrichment. Literacy and Biliteracy classrooms will be designed to excite students' love of reading, writing, and self-expression. All students can perform at high levels of literacy--if they are provided with voice and choice in the classroom.

Mathematics

San Antonio ISD recognizes that the COVID-19 pandemic has had a dramatic impact on students and their ability to perform in mathematics. The pathway forward is through providing additional scaffolding to help students develop deep mathematical understanding of concepts and accelerate their learning. Schools are offering intersession opportunities as well as school-based tutoring sessions for students to have additional instructional time building both critical thinking and problem-solving strategies. Teachers are engaged in ongoing professional learning on evidence-based emerging supports and resources to engage students in relevant and applicable mathematical learning.

Postsecondary Initiatives

San Antonio ISD has committed to opening the doors of postsecondary opportunity to its students by providing the resources and support for students to enter college. From college exploration and selection, to completing college, financial aid and scholarship applications, to registering and entering college in the fall after high school graduation, students have access to a team of staff committed to their success. College Bound Advisors, working closely with campus counselors and support staff, ensure that students are able to move past any barriers they may encounter on their journey to enter and persist in earning a college credential. College Alumni Advisors work to ensure that students who have entered college persist to completion of a college credential and offer enrollment support to students who have graduated from a San Antonio ISD high school and may have delayed college enrollment.

Science

San Antonio ISD believes that effective science instruction exists through the lens of inquiry-learning focused on developing students who understand scientific inquiry and engage in a variety of scientific practices to explain phenomena and solve problems. Through inquiry-learning, students understand science as an iterative, dynamic, creative, and collaborative process similar to how real scientists do their work. Science instruction also allows students to develop models of systems within the natural world, investigate real-world situations, develop critical thinking with productive discourse, and engage in purposeful reading, writing, and speaking on relevant topics.

DIGITAL LEARNING PLAYGROUND



The San Antonio ISD Digital Learning Playground (DLP) is a one-stop shop for student digital learning. Students and families can find lessons and activities designed to engage students in continuous learning. The DLP is the District's continuous learning platform for students and families to engage in activities when they are away from school. Each DLP website features students' favorite digital learning activities such as academic and technology choice boards, family activities, self-care strategies, and resources for parents. Embedded in the lessons are supports such as Immersive Reader. All lessons are delivered in both English and Spanish to meet the needs of our students. New editions of the Digital Learning Playground ([Winter Edition](#), [Spring Edition](#), [Summer Edition](#), [Quarantine Edition](#)) are developed and launched throughout the year to meet the needs of students and their families.

LEARNING IN QUARANTINE



The [Quarantine Edition](#) of the Digital Learning Playground was launched on September 7, 2021 to support the learning of students who are quarantined. A webpage, [Learning in Quarantine](#), and [handout](#) for families was developed with a full menu of lessons for students in grades Pre-K through 12 and their families. Lessons include embedded accessibility accommodations. Grade band specific lessons including Math and Istation are available to elementary students. High school students have full access to Edgenuity.

The following prevention and mitigation strategies are implemented in alignment with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The District will continue to monitor information from the CDC, the San Antonio Metropolitan Health District (Metro Health), and the Texas Education Agency (TEA). There is broad agreement that air quality, mask wearing, handwashing, sanitizing, testing, and vaccination can mitigate the spread of COVID-19. As such, the District will continue to reinforce these best practices.

Hand Washing

Students will continue to be instructed on [proper handwashing](#) and will be provided time within the school day to wash their hands.

Mask Wearing

While the Governor's Executive Order forbids government entities from mandating mask wearing, the CDC recommends universal indoor masking regardless of vaccination status. Individuals who are outdoors should wear masks if they are in congregate settings and unable to socially distance. On August 16, 2021, the San Antonio ISD Board of Trustees adopted a requirement that all students, parents, employees, and visitors wear face coverings at all times when on District property. A resolution was passed by the Board of Trustees on September 13, 2021 reasserting the previous action that requires the use of face coverings of all individuals entering school premises.



The District's mask wearing protocol is informed by guidance from the following entities:

Sanitizing and PPE

Alcohol-based hand sanitizer dispensers are located in each classroom, as well as throughout common areas on each campus. As recommended by the CDC, the District's alcohol-based hand sanitizer contains at least 60% alcohol. Staff and students will be provided with disposable face masks as needed.

Cleaning and Disinfecting

Both horizontal and vertical high-touch surfaces in learning areas will be cleaned daily using an Environmental Protective Agency (EPA) approved cleaning and disinfecting solution, followed by weekly surface treatment using an electrostatic applicator. High-touch surfaces in common areas such as hallways and bathrooms will be cleaned and disinfected several times daily using the EPA-approved solution. The District also employs an additional measure of disinfection by applying a non-toxic, water-based, surface barrier protectant that continuously kills pathogens for up to 30 days.



Cleaning and disinfecting will be required frequently on high-touch surfaces in common areas (e.g., door handles, sink handles, drinking fountains) within the school and on school buses at least daily or between use as much as possible. Use of shared objects (e.g., gym or physical education equipment, art supplies, toys, and/or games) should be limited when possible or cleaned between use.

All spaces occupied by a person who tests positive for COVID-19 will be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected within 24 hours.

Water Systems

To minimize the risk of illness associated with drinking from the same water fountain, all campuses will have at least one water bottle filling station. Students and staff will be asked to bring a refillable water bottle daily.

Air Filtration

The District continues to implement an aggressive preventive maintenance program of the HVAC systems to ensure systems are functioning as intended. In response to COVID-19, staff moved early to improve the air filtration of these systems by changing standard filters to higher efficiency filters designated as MERV-11. These filters are intended to remove micro particles from the air as they move through air handling devices. With the issuance of more recent guidelines of Indoor Air Quality by the CDC and ASHRAE (American Society of Heating, Refrigeration, and Air Conditioning), the District is now using MERV-13 high efficiency filters where possible.



School Buses

Social distancing will be implemented on buses to the maximum extent possible. Students will be seated two to a seat, hand sanitizer stations will be available, buses will be sanitized after every route, every other window will be open, and roof hatches will be open (weather permitting). Individuals riding school buses are required to wear masks. Disposable masks are available to students without one.

Child Nutrition Services

Meals are offered following the guidance of the CDC and Metro Health. The Child Nutrition Services Department continues to implement a detailed food safety plan as mandated by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Food items offered in cafeterias districtwide are made available in individual portions. High touch surfaces are cleaned frequently. Meals are also available to students in quarantine. 


Screenings, Temperature Checks, Rapid Testing, and PCR Testing

Individuals should stay home when they have any infectious illness.

The District will follow basic guidelines recommended by CDC and Metro Health. Campuses may go beyond the minimum guidelines. This includes conducting temperature checks and screening upon entry into the building.

[Weekly PCR testing](#) for students and staff will continue this fall at various sites districtwide. TEA anticipates that rapid testing resources will continue to be provided to school districts. We hope to provide rapid testing for extracurricular participation pending available funding. Additionally, we will continue to use cohort models, when appropriate, to limit student exposure, especially for early childhood students.



Employee Vaccination Requirement

San Antonio ISD recognizes that COVID-19 - and in particular - the highly contagious Delta variant, poses a significant health risk to all District students, families, and staff. On August 20, 2021, a requirement was issued to ensure that all District employees be fully vaccinated by October 15, 2021. The approval of the resolution for the COVID-19 employee vaccination requirement was approved by the San Antonio ISD Board of Trustees on September 13, 2021. By requiring all staff to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19, the District remains steadfast in its commitment to maintain a safe and secure environment. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends COVID-19 vaccinations and boosters as the leading prevention strategy to end the COVID-19 pandemic and help schools safely return to in-person learning and activities.

Currently, public schools cannot require individuals to provide proof of vaccination status; however, the District is requesting that all students and staff provide this information to improve its ability to keep everyone safe. Employees are required to provide evidence of their vaccination status using a survey link by October 15, 2021. The purpose for collecting information regarding vaccination is to inform the District about students or staff members who may be identified as high-risk exposures and who may require quarantining.

Parents will be asked to provide evidence of vaccination status for their children through the campus nurses and the Student Health Services Department after the start of school.

Vaccine Clinics

San Antonio ISD continues to provide ongoing opportunities for all eligible students (ages 12 and older), families, and staff to get vaccinated against COVID-19.

General Quarantine Criteria

San Antonio ISD will align with CDC and Metro Health guidelines to determine when individuals are identified as close contacts and are required to quarantine:

1. Students and staff should remain home when sick.
2. Individuals who are **fully vaccinated** will not have to quarantine if exposed to a lab-confirmed case as long as they are asymptomatic.
3. Individuals who are correctly and consistently masked, using well-fitting masks, will generally not have to quarantine if exposed to a lab-confirmed case.
4. Staff and students who are designated a "close contact" may be quarantined for up to 10 calendar days.

Student cases will be traced by campus nurses. Schools will notify the families of students who were determined to be in close contact with the COVID-19 positive individual.

Volunteers

Due to the high COVID-19 transmission rate in our community, and to reduce risk to students and staff, volunteers and activities involving external groups or organizations will not be allowed in any school or building, during and out of instructional hours, until further notice. This includes parent and community volunteers, classroom helpers, classroom speakers, mentors, tutors, guest speakers, etc. Community use of school or building facilities will not be allowed. San Antonio ISD will require all volunteers in its campuses and administrative buildings to be masked and to have all required COVID-19 doses completed by October 15, 2021, once the volunteer program re-opens.

Visitors

Visitors are restricted to essential school operations for parents. Parents will be allowed on campus for school business, enrollment, parent-teacher conferences, parent nights, etc. Mask wearing is required, as is the physical distancing of 3 feet to the maximum extent possible. Lunch visits are not allowed. San Antonio ISD requires all visitors in its campuses and administrative buildings to be masked.

Partners

San Antonio ISD requires everyone working in its campuses and administrative buildings to be masked, including strategic partners supporting schools. The District requires all staff, including strategic partner staff working on San Antonio ISD campuses, to have all required COVID-19 doses completed by October 15, 2021. Service Providers

Approved service providers visiting campuses will limit their visits to those required for essential school operations. Essential operations include, but are not limited to, facilities support, District meal service, social emotional support, approved deliveries, and services from providers that directly support the educational needs of students. Service providers working in San Antonio ISD campuses or administrative buildings are required to be masked and to have all required COVID-19 doses completed by October 15, 2021.

FAMILY COMMUNICATION



We will provide families with the most up to date information as it pertains to COVID-19 in their child's classroom or school. Additionally, we will continue to communicate information on infections and other COVID-19 updates as it becomes available.

- Letters to Families
Any time a student or staff member on your child's campus is identified as a lab-confirmed COVID-19 positive case, the principal will email a letter to the parents of all students.

- Forums

San Antonio ISD will hold virtual and/or in-person forums including town halls and virtual Q&As to engage families and community members.



SCHOOL UNIFORMS & DRESS CODE

All students must adhere to the District's dress code, which has been updated for the 2021-2022 school year.

The new policy expands clothing options for our students in middle and high school grades, and gives lower grade levels the option of wearing jeans. The new guidelines also allow students to wear their natural hairstyles and religious head coverings.



STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT



The San Antonio Independent School District (SAISD) has adopted the Student Code of Conduct (SCOC) to promote and maintain a positive, safe, and effective learning environment for students and adults. The SCOC articulates the behavior that is not allowable at school or school-affiliated functions or events, on school grounds, or on District transportation so that students and adults are knowledgeable about expectations and standards of behavior.



It is a priority of San Antonio ISD for staff to implement a restorative and instructional approach using evidence-based best practices to respond to student behavior. The student code of conduct provides a repository of resources that lead to improved student outcomes. It also delineates behavior that is not allowed at school, possible disciplinary consequences, and the relevant procedures, protections, and law related to student discipline. ESSER FUND UPDATE



The dollars allocated through the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund are critical to getting our teachers and students back on track and ready to tackle this school year and whatever lies ahead. For the 2021-22 School year, San Antonio ISD has been allocated approximately \$70M from ESSER III funds for year 1; \$70M for year 2 and \$68M for year 3 total \$208 million.

We have developed a comprehensive, working plan to ensure that students are back on track academically, socially, and behaviorally. San Antonio ISD will utilize ESSER funds to mitigate learning loss as a result of the pandemic. The Continuity of Services and ESSER Enhancement Plan outlines the District’s priority areas and was informed by stakeholder engagement sessions, research, and survey data. San Antonio ISD will continue to engage stakeholders regularly as we continue to gather input on the plan in years 2 and 3.
